ENDORSEMENTS

House Bill 5 requires all students to choose an endorsement (program of study) by the end of 9th grade. Most students choose an endorsement now, when signing up for the 9th grade classes unless they are truly undecided. **If you don't know what endorsement you want, choose Multidisciplinary Four by Four.** Students are allowed to change their endorsement the first year (and possibly the second) as long as they are able to complete all endorsement requirements prior to graduation.

A WORD ABOUT PRE-AP CLASSES

If a student signs up for a Pre-AP class, they will be required to stay in it. We do not let students out of advanced classes because they didn't do the summer reading or changed their mind (extenuating circumstances are reviewed on a case-by-case basis). All Pre-AP classes will receive an extra 5 points in GPA calculation if the student passes that class. The 5 extra points is not added to their final grade (as seen on the report card or transcript); it is only added "behind the scenes" in GPA calculation.

Liberty Hill High School DRESS AND GROOMING Standards

Clothing, hairstyles, and accessories should not be disruptive, immodest, or unsafe.

- 1. Apparel and/or accessories that contain references to race, alcohol products, tobacco products, drugs, sex, vulgarity, death, suicide, the occult, or violence either explicitly or by innuendo are prohibited.
- 2. Apparel and/or accessories that denote gang-related association are prohibited (i.e., rags, bandannas, shirts draped over the shoulder, shaved/notched eyebrows, or other physical alterations as identified by local law enforcement).
- 3. Excessively worn, frayed, or altered clothing is prohibited. Rips in clothing above the knee are prohibited.
- 4. Extreme hairstyles are prohibited (i.e., Mohawks, unusually or unnaturally colored hair, excessively spiked hair, etc.) and students' eyes must be visible.
- 5. Males' hair must be above the collar in back and midpoint of the ear in front. Facial hair is prohibited and students must be clean-shaven. Sideburns shall not extend beyond the bottom of the earlobe.
- 6. Piercings are prohibited for males. Females may have piercings only in the ear. Piercing retainers (clear studs) and covering piercing jewelry with tape or bandage are prohibited.
- 7. Caps, hats, head coverings, and/or dark glasses are prohibited inside the building.
- 8. Exposure of cleavage, the back, and/or the midriff is prohibited. Tank tops and tank-style dresses are prohibited. Sleeveless tops must cover the entire shoulder and not expose undergarments.
- 9. Trench coats are prohibited at school and school functions.
- 10. Pants must be size-appropriate and worn at the natural waistline. No sagging pants. Clothing must not reveal underwear. Sleepwear, such as lounge pants or pajamas and bike shorts are prohibited.
- 11. Pants, shorts, skirts, and/or dresses must be longer than the students' fingertips when arms are fully extended down the sides of the body. Shorts, skirts, and/or dresses worn with leggings must meet dress code length.
- 12. Shoes must be worn at all times. House shoes and shoes with wheels are prohibited.
- 13. Dog collars, choker chains, spiked metal items (i.e., necklaces, wrist bands, etc.), safety pins, wallet chains, and/or chains on garments are prohibited.
- 14. Tattoos must be covered at all times. Students shall not mark or draw on body parts or garments.
- 15. The administration has the right to appraise any current fashion or fad and determine whether or not it is appropriate for school.

If an administrator determines that a student's dress and/or grooming violates school standards, the student will be given an opportunity to correct the problem at school, immediately. A parent will be notified if the student is not able or willing to correct the problem, and the student will be assigned to In-School Suspension until the problem has been corrected. Repeat offenses may result in additional disciplinary action.

An administrator, in cooperation with the sponsor of an extracurricular activity, may regulate the dress and grooming standards of students who participate in the activity. Students who violate these standards are subject to disciplinary action and/or may be removed or excluded from the activity for a period deemed appropriate by the administrator or sponsor.

District Handbook Review of Health Related Matters:

Health Related Matters pgs s24-27

Liberty Hill High School has a full time nurse on staff. STUDENTS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO LEAVE CAMPUS DURING THE SCHOOL DAY FOR MINOR COMPLAINTS SUCH AS HEADACHES, MILD SORE THROATS WITHOUT FEVER, NAUSEA, MILD MENSTRUAL CRAMPS, GENERALIZED MALAISE, ETC. There are exceptions which will be dealt with on an individual basis. The nurse will notify parents of students with excessive complaints. A nurse-parent conference will be called when it is felt the student's health problems are interfering with the student's education. The school nurse will be on call for evaluation of any high school student who becomes ill. The nurse's station is to be used by students who are actually ill or who have been involved in an accident. The student must obtain a pass from the teacher before going to the nurse's office (except in emergency situations). If the nurse is not in her office, the student must notify someone in the office. Upon leaving, the student must report back to class with a signed pass.

Illness

A child should not be sent to school if he or she is ill. A sick child needs rest and care in order to recover as quickly as possible. It is very important not to expose other children to illnesses that one can possibly avoid. If your student has been prescribed antibiotics, they must complete the first 24 hours' worth prior to admittance to school.

Fever

A temperature of 100.4 degrees F or higher is considered fever. Students will not be permitted to return to school until they have been fever free for 24 hours without the use of medications. If your student has fever while at school, or returns prior to the 24 hour mark, you will be contacted to make arrangements for your student to be picked up.

Communicable Diseases

Parents of students with a communicable or contagious disease are asked to telephone the school nurse so that the other students who have been exposed to the disease can be alerted; convalescing students are not allowed to come to school until the disease is no longer considered contagious. Any student who has vomited or had two or more bouts of diarrhea will be sent home. They will not be permitted to return to campus until free of symptoms for 24 hours without use of suppressing medications. If the nurse has reason to believe that the student may have a communicable disease, for example, inflamed eyes, vomiting, diarrhea, spreading sores around the lips, nonspecific rash, etc., the nurse will call the parent to pick the student up from school and ask that the parent bring a physician's statement that the student is not contagious and may return to school, or keep the student at home until the symptoms subside.

Lice

Liberty Hill High School follows the American Association of Pediatrics' and Texas State Department of Health Services' recommendations when dealing with head lice. Lice is not grounds for exclusion from school, nor is it considered to be a communicable disease. If your student is found to have evidence of lice- either live organisms or nits, you will be contacted simply to notify you and to offer assistance in a plan of action. If the infestation is to the point in which it is impacting your child's ability to function at school, you will be asked to pick your student up.

Medications

The school nurse does not carry stock medications for students. Students requiring medications must complete and return a Medication Release Form along with their own supply of medication to the Nurse. Students are not permitted to carry or distribute their own medications- the only exception to this are diabetic and emergent medications such as Epi Pens and Diastat, which still require signed Medication Forms to be on file with the Nurse. Students carrying and administering their own medications poses a risk not only for that student, but for the other students on our campus. Students found to be in possession of medications- either prescription or over the counter, face disciplinary action. District policy outlines that students requiring medication to be administered three times a day do so before school, after school, and at night. Only medications in which the prescribing physician explicitly states a time which falls within our school day will be administered by the Nurse. Morning medications should be administered prior to the start of school to ensure they are effective by the start of your student's day. Once a day medications for conditions such as allergies must be taken at home. Medications classed as controlled substances cannot be sent with a student. They must be dropped off by an adult directly to the Nurse and picked up in the same manner. The Nurse CANNOT distribute any medication classed as a narcotic, nor are students able to take any form of narcotic and attend school- regardless of prescription. Narcotics can be very useful in controlling pain after certain procedures, however the effects they have mentally can pose a risk to your student and others around them. A complete list of medication rules and policies can be found on the back of the Medication Release Form in your Nurse's office or on the Nurse section of the school's webpage.

EXCUSED ABSENCES may be given for the following reasons only. THESE TYPES OF ABSENCES COUNT TOWARDS THE MAXIMUM NUMBER OF ABSENCES ALLOWABLE AND COULD RESULT IN LOSS OF CREDIT.

- 1. Verified illness. All medical/healthcare appointments must be documented with a note from the doctor's office.
- 2. Death in the immediate family.
- 3. Court appearance (official notice of appearance must be supplied to the principal in order for this to be considered a legitimate/excused absence).
- 4. An emergency or special set of circumstances judged as sufficient by the school authorities.
- 5. Religious holidays.

MEDICATION POLICY

- 1. Prescription medications should be given at home in the mornings so that your student is comfortable and ready to start the school day. Most prescription meds are given 2- 3 times a day, at home before school, and /or at home after school and at bedtime. If additional doses are *prescribed by your physician*, medications may be administered at school with a parent's written request (attached) expressing the need for such medication at school and the parent provides the medication.
- 2. Non-prescription medications (OTC) must be in the original container. The dosing direction on the OTC packaging regarding age, amount and frequency of medication administered will be strictly followed. OTC medications taken on a "daily" basis (pain relievers, allergy medication etc.) need to be taken at home before school so your child will be prepared to have a successful day with the least amount of interruptions. Requests to alter the dosage, frequency or length of time recommended (most, no more than 7 days) of the medications to be administered must be accompanied by a *physician's order* stating the dosage of medication to be given and that it is necessary to administer an alternative dosage at school.
- 3. Prescription medications (this includes samples) must be in the original container, properly labeled with that student's name, medication name, dosing instructions and prescribing date. Prescription must be ordered by a physician licensed to practice in the United States.
- 4. Medications must be stored in the locked medications cabinet in the school health clinic and administered by Health Services personnel or other trained school employees. It is the students responsibility (if age appropriate) to come to the School Health Clinic at the appropriate time to take their medication.
- 5. **Narcotic pain relievers**/Hydrocodone combination products (Lortab, Vicoprofen, Norco) will not be administered in the school setting. Pain requiring Narcotics for relief should be dealt with at home where your student will be safe and can obtain adequate rest to assist with healing.
- 6. Parents/guardians must deliver and pick up all medications that are controlled substances to/from the school clinic. Controlled substances should not be transported by students and will be counted by the campus nurse upon receiving them and the count will be documented. The parent is responsible for obtaining these medications from the campus nurse at the end of the school year to avoid discarding.
- 7. A student will be allowed to self-administer inhaled asthma medication, an Epi-pen, or diabetes treatments if the following conditions have been complied with:
 - a. Written permission from the physician allowing the student to self-medicate or treat.
 - b. Parent and Student understand the school's inability to monitor the student's health condition during the school day while self- medicating or treating.
 - c. The student complies with all campus safety policies.
 - d. Students will be responsible for possessing their own inhalers, Epi-pens or diabetic equipment / supplies during school hours and at after school activities.
- 8. Health Services personnel will properly dispose of any medication remaining after the close of the school year.
- 9. No District employee shall administer herbal substances, anabolic steroids or dietary supplements of any type except: "Herbal substances or dietary supplements may be administered as prescribed by the physician, provided by the parent, and only if required by the Individual Education Program or Section 504 plan of a student with disabilities". Dietary Supplements and herbal substances are not FDA approved.

The Nurse Practice Act; Texas Administrative Code, Section 217.11, states that the Registered Nurse and the Licensed Vocational Nurse have the responsibility and authority to refuse to administer medications that, in the nurse's judgment, are contra-indicated for administration to that student.
